We are local people supporting students to remain in the region, promoting aspiration and participation in higher education to meet regional workforce needs.

This year, we proudly celebrated our fourth birthday - four years of growth in our learning community. Our journey has been shaped by the dedication of our Board, staff, students, and partners who have contributed to the success of CUC Bass Coast. Since opening in March 2021, we've supported 493 regional students in their pursuit of higher education, with 115 graduates achieving significant milestones in their academic and personal journeys. At the heart of these achievements remains our mission: to provide equitable access to higher education for people in our region. Our story is one of community. CUC Bass Coast is locally led and governed by an independent Board, proudly part of the Country University Centre broader Network. Each Centre is embedded in its local context and designed to meet regional needs through place-based learning.

Fundamental to this mission is creating a space where students feel connected and supported. As local people supporting local students, we are building aspiration, participation, and pathways into higher education, while responding to regional workforce needs. We recognise the importance of programs in supporting students to take their next steps — and we take pride in walking alongside each individual as they progress toward their goals. I wish to acknowledge the dedication of the CUC student Coast staff and ambassadors, whose commitment ensures the Centre remains welcoming, professional, and student-centred. I also thank our Board for their support and leadership, and our community partners for their collaboration. Most importantly, I commend our students, who inspire us every day with their determination to achieve their educational goals.

The Country Universities Centre began with the establishment of the Cooma Universities Centre in 2013. It was created to offer enhanced, supported higher education opportunities in this regional township, home to around 7,000 people.

The partnership centres on delivering Federation University's Bachelor of Nursing program locally, enabling students to study and complete placements without leaving the region. This collaboration directly responds to regional workforce needs in healthcare and provides an accessible tertiary pathway for local people.



### South Gippsland Bass Coast Local Learning & Employment Network

The collaboration is centred on building aspiration, awareness, and access to higher education for young people across the Bass Coast and South Gippsland regions, including our annual scholarship guide, speed careers conversations and careers expos.

### **RPPPP Partner Universities**

Partnerships with Swinburne University of Technology and the Australian Catholic University (ACU) have been instrumental in delivering the FutureBound program. Funded by the Regional Partnerships Project Pool Program (RPPPP), these universities have provided expertise, resources, and engagement opportunities for local tertiary pathways.



### **Bass Coast Health**

Our partnership is aimed at strengthening local education and workforce pathways in the health sector, through placements, mentoring, and exposure to university-level health studies, creating clear pathways for students interested in nursing, allied health, and other medical fields.





The FutureBound program engages students from local schools in activities that demystify university life, build aspiration and encourage early career and pathway exploration.

### **FutureBound Program**

The Regional Partnerships Project Pool Program (RPPPP) has provided valuable opportunities to address gaps in widening participation across regional, rural, and remote areas. Through this initiative, the Futurebound program has been developed to eto address accessibility to higher education pathways in our region the program helps to build student confidence, connect them with our student ambassadors and other role models to learn about being a regional student to understand the possibilities of tertiary study without leaving their community.

To date over 2200 students have participated in the program. At the heart of FutureBound's success is the engagement of student ambassadors as local role models, making higher education more visible, relevant, and achievable across Bass Coast and South Gippsland.









### **Here For Our Students**

With the support of CUC regional, rural and remote students can follow their dreams when it comes to study. CUC Bass Coast continually responds to student needs, creating an innovative model that allows choice by supporting any student, studying any course, at any Australian Tertiary Education Provider.

The wrap-around model of student services provides face-to-face academic, wellbeing, digital literacy and administrative support in a learning community, in addition to what each student's university already provides. These extra layers of support are crucial for many students who study at our Centre.

Regional students are often at greater risk of attrition. Many students are the first in their family to attend university, or have caring responsibilities and multiple other commitments. We offer a free, safe and welcoming environment to study with flexible and personalised face-to-face support.

CUC Bass Coast understand that students are individuals that need a variety of services to support their needs so that we meet students where they are in their education journey. We have seen a significant increase in engagement in mentoring and academic literacy support sessions, reflecting our role not only as a place of study, but as a genuine learning community.

# ime For Growth

This year CUC Bass Coast strengthened its position as a leader in higher education in the region. More than 200 students from 41 universities engaged with the Centre, reflecting a strong demand for our local, supported study centre. The student cohort represented a diverse mix of school leavers, career changers, and mature learners, demonstrating the value of a community-based model that enables people to study close to home.

Partnerships remained central to CUC Bass Coast's success. Collaboration with schools, universities, TAFEs, local councils, and community organisations enhanced educational engagement and awareness of tertiary pathways. Through initiatives such as FutureBound and collaborative careers events, the Centre continued to raise aspiration and provide practical insights into university life. Engagement with local government and industry partners supported workforce development, particularly in the health, education, and care sectors, helping address critical regional skills needs.

Supported through the Regional Partnerships Project Pool Program (RPPPP), FutureBound expanded its reach, engaging more than 2,200 students across Bass Coast and South Gippsland. Delivered with Swinburne University, Australian Catholic University, and the South Gippsland Bass Coast Local Learning and Employment Network (SGBCLLEN). The program builds confidence, connects students with local role models, and shows that tertiary study is possible without leaving the community.

These achievements reflect a year of growth and meaningful impact, reinforcing CUC Bass Coast's vital role in creating accessible, locally supported higher education pathways.

### **Student Growth & Engagement**

CUC Bass Coast continued to see strong student enrolments, with over 200 students registered across universities. Students from diverse backgrounds, including school leavers, career changers, and mature learners, accessed our facilities, reaffirming the demand for regional study support. Engagement in workshops, mentoring, and academic literacy support sessions grew, reflecting the Centre's role not only as a place of study, but as a genuine learning community.

### **Community Partnerships**

Our partnerships with local schools, universities, TAFEs, and community organisations have strengthened. Through programs such as Future Bound and collaborative careers events, we have worked to nurture aspiration and increase awareness of higher education pathways. We also deepened relationships with local government and industry, particularly in areas workforce development, addressing regional shortages in health, education, and allied trades.

### **National and Regional Advocacy**

The Centre contributed to the broader Country University Centre network's advocacy efforts, ensuring that the needs and voices of regional students were represented at both State and Federal levels. The recognition of Regional University Study Hubs within the Federal higher education Government's strategy continues to validate the model.



Currently studying a Bachelor of Primary Education, Shanah was inspired to become a teacher after working in Education Support at a specialist school. Now in her third semester and studying full-time, she juggles a very full house, with five kids at home all the time, and a blended family of nine. "It feels like a lot on a day-to-day basis, but looking back, it's gone really quickly," she said. "A friend told me the best thing he ever did was sign up at CUC, so I came straight here." And it's made all the difference. "I've met quite a few people here. Everyone is easy to talk to, and the staff are amazing — so nice and helpful. I've had help with a few assignments, and it's really improved my assessments. It's completely supportive and non-judgmental."

After beginning with a Certificate IV in Health Foundations, Shawn built up the confidence to pursue her dream of becoming a midwife. With the support of a government upskilling incentive and a scholarship through Bass Coast Health, she's been able to balance work, study, and family life — all while following her passion. "I love learning about the things I'm really interested in, and CUC is so positive and supportive. Everyone's friendly, and you're surrounded by like-minded people." Shawn says she always recommends "the big orange building" to anyone she knows who's studying, and she's already referred a few friends who've gone on to study too! From initially doubting her abilities, to becoming a role model for her kids and community, Shawn's story is a beautiful reminder to believe in yourself and never give up on your dreams.

After completing her Bachelor of Occupational Therapy at ACU, Gabby transitioned into mental health and went on to complete a Graduate Certificate in Mental Health. "CUC was a game changer for me," Gabby shares. "Studying 100% online while working full-time was tough at home, but CUC gave me a quiet, dedicated space with all the resources I needed. The buddy system and flexibility really set me up for success." When asked what her advice would be to others considering study, she said: "Explore online or mixed learning options and consider part-time study. Grad Certs are such an accessible way to grow professionally while balancing life and work." Gabby is currently studying a Graduate Certificate in Child and Adolescent Mental Health to further support her work.

After working in mental health and completing a Master of Counselling, Sophie noticed a rise in the complexity of mental health issues during COVID, along with limited local referral options. This inspired her to return to study a Bachelor of Psychological Sciences.

"I enjoyed learning about the whole discipline, scientific models and frameworks that I could put into practice." Soph says one of her biggest lessons was learning to trust the process, especially when things felt unfamiliar or challenging. When she moved to Bass Coast in 2019, Soph hadn't heard of CUC until a colleague mentioned it. "It was a physical space that I could just study, it meant that home was home and CUC was my dedicated study space."

Growing up in Wonthaggi and a former student at Bass Coast College (formerly Wonthaggi Secondary College), Rees is an example of what's possible when students from regional communities are supported to pursue their passion. "Even though I've spent much of my career in Melbourne, the focus of my PhD was always the Bass Coast," said Rees. "It explored our connections to place, and how our communities, personal histories, and the land are deeply intertwined. Being able to research and write about this region while being here physically and having access to a dedicated study space at CUC was extremely helpful.

regional Rees encourages other students to embrace higher learning in whatever form it takes. "I got a huge amount of fulfilment and joy out of it," he said. "It was also a slog at times. But that's where the value of a place like CUC gave me a structure, framework, and a support network that kept me accountable and on track." Rees' story shows that learning doesn't have to stop after high school or an undergraduate degree. It also speaks to the broader mission of the CUC, which is to make higher education more accessible and viable for regional students, across all stages of life.

Studying part-time over three years, Kim balanced her family responsibilities while steadily working toward her goal.

me "Graduating has given the opportunity to re-enter the workforce with the qualifications to do what I love." "CUC was a game changer for me! I had full-day weekend workshops, and it was hard for my husband to take the kids out for that long. The library was closed, and community spaces cost money. The breakout rooms at CUC were exactly what I needed." When asked what advice she would give to others considering study in a rural or regional area, Kim says: "Higher education gives you opportunities and choices. If you have the capacity, it's well worth it, and having a quiet, well-resourced facility like CUC makes it achievable."
